Tips to Encourage Early Literacy Skills

- Read together every day. This shows your child that reading and spending time together is important.
- Always make reading together a warm and happy experience, whether you cuddle up together at bedtime, or read for a few moments during playtime.
- Talk about what you see in a book. Look at the pictures and encourage your child to describe what they see.
- Let your child see you reading. They will want to do what you do.
- Point out words everywhere you see them on signs, labels, and even at the grocery store. Show your child how you use print every day.
- Sing songs with your child. Finding the rhythm helps break bigger words into smaller parts.
- Take your child to the library regularly. Libraries are a wonderful place to find books, music and so much more!

Talk Sing Read Write Play

Children who enjoy being read to are more likely to want to learn to read themselves.
