Renovations & Renewals



The new **Transcona Library**, 1 Transcona Boulevard, is opening on March 7 at 10 am. Grand opening celebrations, starting at 10:30 am, will include opening remarks, refreshments and music by Starlight Jazz. The new library is fully accessible with increased parking, an indoor family literacy playground, improved study and leisure areas and an outdoor reading area.

The **St. John's library**, 500 Salter Street, is currently undergoing renovations and is expected to reopen in spring 2019. Renovations and a new accessible entrance will ensure the library meets the needs of today's library users.

The **Cornish Library**, 20 West Gate, is undergoing renovations and is expected to reopen in 2020.

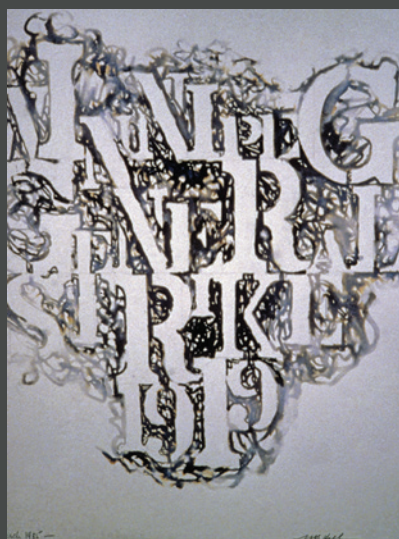

If a program is full, you may be placed on a wait list. Please provide your email and phone number so we can keep you up to date on your program. You will receive a courtesy email of your registration status. If you do not have an email address, staff will attempt to notify you by phone of status changes. Repeat registrants for a program may be placed on a wait list. No-show registrants may be denied future space.

Cancellations

Programs often have wait lists. Call the library or follow the link on your email confirmation if you need to cancel your registration. All programs are subject to change without notice. Library staff will make every reasonable attempt to notify you of registered program cancellations.

Sign Language Interpretation

Sign language interpretation (ASL) is available for library programs in English at no charge. Please fill out the Ask Us form to request service at least 5 days before the event through Contact Us at winnipeg.ca/library.

Learn about these vases and how presenter Heather Sharpe and a group of students experimented with replicas - some reveled in the thrill of victory while others wallowed in the messiness of defeat.

March 20: The 1919 Winnipeg General Strike Tour

Nolan Reilly's popular Winnipeg General Strike Tour comes to the library with an introduction to the key events and players of the most prominent general strike in Canada's history.

Nolan Reilly (Senior Scholar, University of Winnipeg) is co-author of the original 1919: Winnipeg General Strike Tour. Together with Sharon Reilly, retired museum curator, they have created a new edition – coming this April.

March 27: Labour Protest Songs

The labour and civil rights movements have a strong tradition of protest songs that galvanized workers and all seeking social justice. This session, led by Mitch Podolak and Darryl Reilly, will introduce key protest songs along with their history.

Mitch Podolak is a prominent folk music expert and founder of the Winnipeg Folk Festival. Darryl Reilly co-hosted 'Peg City Groove, CKUW Radio, University of Winnipeg.

April 3: Reflection on Revolt: Remembering the Winnipeg General Strike

Dennis Lewycky lays out the history of the Strike in context of the social, political and economic conditions of the period. He illustrates the effects the Strike had on workers and unions in the decades that followed. His new book, *Magnificent Fight*, speaks to the power of social justice and labour organizing, and reveals the lengths to which the capitalist class and the state will go to protect the status quo.

Dennis Lewycky is a Winnipeg activist and Strike Tour leader. Magnificent Fight will be available to purchase at this event.

April 10: Brookside Cemetery Virtual Tour

Paul Moist will introduce you to a dozen key figures from the General Strike who are interred at Brookside Cemetery, including key figures who held leadership positions in organizing the strike. Others were workers whose stories have not been previously brought to light.


Paul Moist is a retired labour leader and Research Associate with the Canadian Centre for Policy Alternatives (Manitoba). A walking tour of Brookside Cemetery will be offered in 2019. See mfl.ca/1919 for details.

April 17: The Fight for a Better Life – Contemporary Lessons from the General Strike

Basia Sokal and Kevin Rebeck discuss the key contemporary lessons to be drawn from the 1919 Winnipeg General Strike.

Baisa Sokal is president of the Winnipeg Labour Council. Kevin Rebeck is president of the Manitoba Federation of Labour.

Your library card gives you access to 1.4 million items to borrow and a wide range of programs and services. Use your library card at all 20 branches of Winnipeg Public Library and online to access an extensive eLibrary of eBooks, eMagazines, streaming music and movies, eAudiobooks and learning resources at winnipeg.ca/library.

Borrow from any branch. Return to any branch.

Getting a Library Card

Library cards are free if you live in, or pay property or business taxes to, the City of Winnipeg. Sign up at any branch of Winnipeg Public Library and bring acceptable ID. First replacement card is free.

Full membership: For all ages. Children and teens (up to age 17) require a parent or guardian to sign the membership application. Valid for 3 years. Borrow up to 50 items at a time.

Limited membership: For Winnipeg citizens of any age without proof of address. Valid for 1 year. Borrow up to 2 items at a time. All other services included.

Non-residents of Winnipeg: Purchase full membership for \$151; covers all family household members. Valid for 1 year. Check with your rural municipality; they may reimburse all or a portion of this fee.

Visitors: For short-term visitors to Winnipeg; purchase full membership for \$60. Valid for 3 months.

Visitor Internet Privilege (VIP): For short-term visitors to Winnipeg to access library computers only. Valid for 14 days. No charge.

Corporate cards: For organizations only; see winnipeg.ca/library for full details. Borrow up to 100 items at a time.

Your Account

Your library card number is also your account number.

Report lost or stolen cards to the library immediately. You are responsible for all activities on your card. Cardholders are responsible for lost or damaged items. See staff for details.

Log in to the Library Catalogue to see the items you have checked out, your requests and holds, and to pay your fines and fees online. Please provide us with your current phone number and email address. You are still responsible for holds, fees and overdue fines if the library cannot contact you.

Use only your own card to use library computers

Email and Notifications

Email has benefits! Ask staff to set your account to email notification instead of phone and we will send you a courtesy reminder 3 days before an item is due.

Sign up for our News & Events email list to stay up to date on the library at winnipeg.ca/library.

Requests/Holds

Can't find what you're looking for? Title already checked out? A request puts you on a waiting list for that item. You will be notified when the item is on hold for you and ready to pick up. Look for the Holds area in the library and check out the item at the staffed checkout counter or at the self-checkout stations.

You can place up to 50 requests at a time. Requests cannot be placed on: Reference, Local History Room, Express, Magazines and Preschool Packs.

Renewals

- You can renew an item (borrow it for longer) when:
- Renewals are allowed on the item

- There are no requests
- You have not reached the maximum number of renewals allowed
- Your membership has not expired, and will not expire before the new due date
- Your unpaid balance is not over \$15.
- If an item cannot be renewed, a message will tell you why and the current due date will remain. To avoid overdue fines, renew your items before midnight on the due date.

There are limits on how many items you can borrow from each of these collections. Borrow up to a maximum each of:

- Books and Magazines: 50
- Music CDs and Audiobooks: 20
- DVDs: 10 adult and 10 children /teen
- Blu-rays: 5 adult and 10 children / teen
- Express Books: 5 adult, 5 teen, and 5 children
- Express DVDs: 2 adult, 2 teen, and 2 children
- Express Blu-rays: 2 adult, 2 teen, and 2 children
- Video Games: 2
- Book Club Kits: 2
- Preschool Packs: 1

You cannot borrow items if your unpaid balance is over \$15.


