## **Guest Speaker Highlights**

**BACKGROUND INFO - FRIENDS OF THE WINNIPEG PUBLIC LIBRARY INC.** 

Prepared by President, Kathy Blight and Secretary, Heather Graham Winnipeg Public Library Board meeting of September 3, 2019

The Friends of the Winnipeg Public Library is an organization for people who are committed to assisting the Winnipeg Public Library in providing the best possible library system that Winnipeg can have. We believe that a vibrant public library system is the heart and soul of a successful community. We are a volunteer charitable organization and an important partner of the Winnipeg Public Library.

The Friends' became incorporated on January 20, 1992 and as of January 1, 1994 became a charitable organization.

In 2014 the Articles of Incorporation were amended:

The undertaking of the Corporation is restricted to the following:

1. Supporting the Winnipeg Public Library ("the Library") in promoting the use of the Library and appreciation of its value as an important research, educational, and cultural asset to the community;

2. Raising funds to support activities and programs that the Library has identified as being of value;

3. Providing an organization for citizens who are committed to a public library system and its services and who are willing to contribute their time and expertise to support the Library;

4. Organizing programs and events of interest to members of the Corporation.

The Friends organization has gone through many changes.

- In the former Metro Winnipeg a Library Friends group was formed in the early 60s and operated for a few years.
- Some suburban libraries in the early and mid-70s had Friends groups for small scale fundraising, before urban and suburban public libraries amalgamated in 1979.

In the 90s, FWPL ...

- Presented author readings and other speakers for the public
- Held writing contests for school children
- Distributed withdrawn library materials to social agencies
- Advocated to elected officials about funding and policies, in support of WPL
- Participated several times in focus groups to provide input into the Library Board's strategic planning initiative in 1995-96
- In the early 2000s, sponsored, with the Library, a literacy conference

Currently the focus is raising funds to support Winnipeg Public Library programs and special projects.

## BOARD

The business of the Corporation is managed by a working board of not less than three and not more than 15 directors. Each director has one vote, and a majority of the directors is a quorum. All Board members have coverage under the Friends of the Winnipeg Public Library's Directors Insurance Policy.

The Board is made up of 12 to 15 people who share a love of reading and are supporters of literacy. Also, on the board is a Library Liaison. The Board places a high priority on literacy and learning and we work hard all year to raise money to fund projects and programs that support this belief.

Each year the Friends of the Winnipeg Public Library contribute to the Writer in Residence Program located at the Millennium Library and the Spring Break Programs offered at the Libraries throughout the city. As well, the Friends provide financial assistance for Winnipeg Public Library programs and special projects as presented annually by the Library Staff and approved by the Friends' Board of Directors. The attached shows what has been supported by the Friends over the years.

This is how we do it: funds are raised through the Spring Books & Brunch and Fall Book Sale events, the operation of the Best of Friends Gift Shop, and membership fees and donations.

### **SPRING BOOKS & BRUNCH**

The Friends annually organizes the fabulous Spring Books & Brunch, a special event for book lovers, held the first Sunday in May. The first Books & Brunch was held at McNally Robinson Prairie Ink Café in 2005. The event's popularity grew steadily, and a move to The Gates on Roblin in 2008 helped accommodate the growing audience. It has become the Spring Event to attend. The location is

lovely, the brunch is delicious and our speakers always charm and inspire those in attendance. The theme is "Books I Have Known and Loved". Speakers share their reading memories, talk about books that made a lasting impression or maybe just made them laugh. The book lists, which are distributed to each attendee, are wide-ranging, from childhood favourites to adult novels, poetry, philosophy, and non-fiction. As the speakers talk, you will see many people making notes about the books that are special to them. Past speakers have been interesting people from our community – Terry MacLeod, Allan Levine, Joan Thomas, Andrew Davidson, Charlene Diehl, David Bergen, Ron Robinson, plus many others. Each presenter has brought their unique style and perspective to the discussion. The event always draws a warm response.

# FALL BOOK SALE

The Fall Book Sale offers prime quality gently used books, CDs, DVDs, and LPs. This event began in the fall of 2005 as a Craft and Book Sale which has become a Book Sale only. The two day event is held annually in October at Grant Park High School.

During the year, members as well as the general public drop off bags or boxes marked FRIENDS at any of the Libraries throughout the city. The Library's courier transports the donations to the St James Library, which provides the Friends with a sorting area. Throughout the year volunteers sort, price and pack boxes. (This is where most of the books sold on the Best of Friends Gift Shop Book Cart also come from.) At the Fall Book Sale, buyers are so keen they line up well before the doors open and rush in to scoop up armloads of prize buys. Hundreds of volunteer hours, thousands of donated books and all those eager customers make this sale a winner.

## **BEST OF FRIENDS GIFT SHOP**

The Friends of the Winnipeg Public Library operates the Best of Friends Gift Shop located in the lobby of the Millennium Library which opened in November, 2005. Special thanks to the Winnipeg Public Library Board for the \$13,000 provided toward the cost of getting the Gift Shop up and running.

At the beginning the Best of Friends Gift Shop employed three staff, then it was down to one person three times a week, then two times a week and as of 2016 the shop had no paid staff. From that time on awesome volunteers man the gift shop six days a week from 11:00 am to 4:00 pm. These volunteers have been an integral part of the success of the Gift Shop

The top selling items are used books, cards, specialty socks, tote bags, and journals.

The Book Cart, located in the lobby just outside the gift shop, is always overflowing with good quality gently used books, DVDs, and CDs. These are donated by people from all over the city, who want their books to find a new home, which in turn helps support the Libraries they love.

The Best of Friends Gift Shop in many ways is the face of the Friends of the Winnipeg Public Library. It supplies membership forms along with the Funding List showing what the Friends have supported over the years. To encourage those buying used books to think about donating to the Friends and supporting the Book Sale, Shop volunteers provide the handout "Too Many Books?" The Gift Shop volunteers also make people aware of what benefits they have when becoming a member.

### **MEMBERSHIP**

The annual membership fee is \$20.00 for an individual and \$25.00 for a family. This gives a 10% discount off regular priced items in the Best of Friends Gift Shop and a discount voucher which is used annually toward the purchase the McNally Robinson Reader Reward Card. Also, the Friends produce a newsletter called NOTES, which is sent to over 900 people via email.

As well, Gift Memberships are available for that special someone who loves to read and libraries.

### DONATIONS

Monetary donations are received from members as well as the general public. The donations come from individuals who believe in our initiatives, and who give in honour of a person's birthday or a special event in their lives. Then there are those that wish to donate in memory of a loved one. All donors receive an income tax receipt.

According to CRA, all records involving the Friends of the Winnipeg Public Library are to be kept on file at 251 Donald St. These documents are in a storage area on the third floor, in the Library Administration office area. This is where the Best of Friends Gift Shop files are stored as well.

All mail for the Friends of the Winnipeg Public Library and Best of Friends Gift Shop is sent to 251 Donald St. A mail folder has been provided in the Library Administration's third floor office.

As you can see by the attached Friends' Funding List, our contributions to the Winnipeg Public Library have been steadily increasing. In April, it was very exciting for our board to be able to approve \$43,000 in support of programs and special projects for library members to enjoy. Our relationship with Ed Cuddy and the Administration Staff is very strong. We look forward to hearing next year's suggested proposals. Special thanks to all Library Staff for their support of the Friends.

In the past few years this organization has been very successful. With success come challenges, with the main one being having volunteers with the required skills to manage this success. A Strategic Planning Session will be held the end of September. The Friends board, along with other volunteer stakeholders, will be discussing this.

#### Annual programs supported by the Friends of the Winnipeg Public Library

**Writer-in-Residence** – Since 2000 as a co-sponsor, we have contributed \$38,750 to this program. Each year an established writer is selected to mentor new, emerging and established writers.

**Spring Break family programming**, sponsored by Friends since 2006, has received contributions of \$37,000. All branches offer a wide variety of activities for families.

Since 2012, in consultation with library managers, we have provided funding for a wide range of programs and proposed projects. Some programs would not be possible without our support and others benefit from a little extra financial help. The managers continue to impress us with the scope and variety of projects and programs. It is such a pleasure to be able to partner with them to make things happen.

FWPL has, including the above programs, contributed \$278,000 to support Winnipeg Public Library projects and programs. This has been achieved by raising funds through events such as Spring Books & Brunch and the Fall Book Sale, and by operating the Best of Friends Gift Shop located in the lobby of the Millennium Library.

- Percussion instruments such as jingle bells, rhythm sticks and also "juggling" scarves for preschool programs at all branch libraries. These new resources enrich early literacy programs with music and movement.
- Coffee/tea refreshments for adult book clubs at all branches; and for the Canada 150 special Stephen Leacock storytelling event at the end of October.
