How to Submit Your Manuscript

Manuscripts can be sent from October 1, 2025 to March 15, 2026. The program is open to Manitobans only.

There are three ways to submit:

Manuscript submissions must follow these guidelines:

- Typed in 12-point font
- Prose is to be double-spaced, no more than 15 pages
- Poetry is to be single-spaced, no more than six poems

Include a cover letter with:

- A brief description of your writing background
- Any specific feedback you would like
- All contact information including an email address
- * Printed submissions must be copies as they will not be returned.

Ariel will contact writers directly to follow up. The Writer-in-Residence service is free.

Ariel Gordon (she/her) is a Winnipeg/ Treaty 1 territory-based writer, editor, and enthusiast. She is the coordinator of Writes of Spring with the Winnipeg International Writers Festival. She is poetry editor of The Goose, an environmentally-themed journal. Gordon is the author of seven books, the most recent of which are the essay collection Fungal: Foraging in the Urban Forest (Wolsak & Wynn, 2024) and the just-released speculative fiction hybrid novel Blood Letters, co-authored with GMB Chomichuk (Great Plains Press, 2025). Ariel also worked as a publicist for University of Manitoba Press and the Winnipeg International Writers Festival - and as a copy editor with the Winnipeg Free Press.
